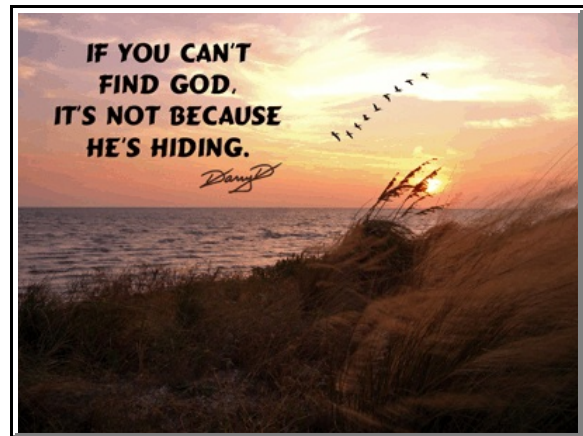
All that is really required is calling upon our God — who is always right there, already working on the problem, and stopping to listen.
