

# CHANGE EMAIL SIGNATURES



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Click on any blue, underlined text to go to its linked reference.

Using Photo Mail, in the Elements Organizer, is a quick and efficient way to send photos via email. (See our Lesson 5-3, *Send Photos by Email* at <http://DarryD.com/PSE6>.)

However, there are two challenges.

First, the Subject of emails is automatically filled with “These are the Photos I want to share with you,” so if you don’t like it, you have to change it.

Secondly, after any photos included in the email comes a commercial: “I sent these photos using Adobe(R) Photoshop(R) Elements 6.0. Find out more: <http://www.adobe.com/products/photoshopelwin/>”

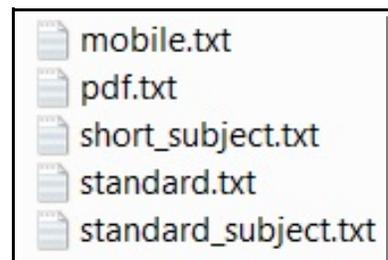
Wouldn’t it be neat to have customized signatures? Here’s how.

1. With Elements closed, select Start ► My Computer (in Windows ME/XP) or Start ► Computer (in Vista).

2. Double-click on the folders in the right pane to get to the folder:  
*C:\Program Files\Adobe\Photoshop Elements 6.0\shared\_assets\locales\en\_us\email\signatures*

3. There you will find five documents (**Figure 1**):

- mobile.txt
- pdf.txt
- short\_subject.txt
- standard.txt
- standard\_subject.txt

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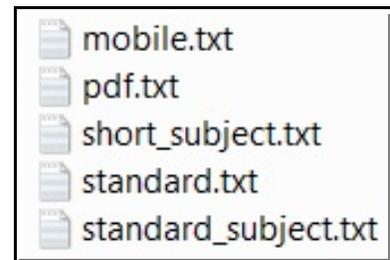
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4. If you Double, left-click on each one, it should open in WordPad. If it does not:

- ❶ Exit whatever program opened the file.
- ❷ RIGHT-click on the file.
- ❸ Left-click on Open with ► WordPad.

5. Change the text to whatever you wish to say.

**NOTE:** I changed all four of the documents to read “Photos by Darry D” and changed the standard.txt to show my signature block.

6. Use File ► Save to replace the existing file.

**NOTE:** You’ll have to Exit WordPad after changing each document.

7. Restart your computer.

8. Open Photoshop Elements and share those photos with friends and family.
