VIEW FILES & FOLDERS SIDE-BY-SIDE

Sometimes, you'll want to copy or to move large numbers of files from one folder to another. This can be expedited by using this system to view files and folders side-by-side. (In technobabble, we call that a "tree".)

To select files:

- To select one file, left-click on it.
- To select all the files, either use the Edit > Select > All (from the MenuBar) or use Ctrl+A (hold down the Ctrl key lower-left on the keyboard and touch the A key, releasing both immediately) to select all the text or drag your cursor to select a specific amount of text. All will be selected (highlighted).
- **To select multiple files that are** *contiguous* (one-after-the-other), click on the first one and use Shift+Click (hold down the Shift key and click releasing both keys quickly) on the last one of the files you want. ALL the files between the first one clicked and the last one clicked are selected (highlighted).
- **To select multiple files that are** *non-contiguous*, single, left-click on the first file. Use Ctrl+Click (hold down the Ctrl key and click) on any other files you want included. All will be selected (highlighted).

Here is how to change the view and to copy/move files. (I'll use the "My Documents" folder for this example.)

- From the Desktop, select Start
 My Documents.
- 2. Click on the "Folders" icon (Figure 1).





- 3. The view is now side-by-side (Figure 2).
- 4. Select the file or folder you want to copy or move.

5. RIGHT-click, hold and drag the file to the destination folder (Figure 3).



You RIGHT-click and drag (instead of Left-click) is so you get this choice-of-options window.

If you left-click and drag, the default option of "move" is automatically the result.
